Can the identity of Great Yarmouth be attributed to its typographical history?

Aims

This project aims to examine the use of typography within the borough of Great Yarmouth, Norfolk, to gain a better understanding of how it has influenced the identity it portrays today.

Objectives

1. To conduct an in-depth examination to decipher the part typography plays in a location's identity and provide a visual commentary on how this has developed through the passage of time.
2. Secondary to this objective, the project will also look at 'identity' and what factors are included in its makeup and definition.
3. Synthesising this research will allow me to draw conclusions from my findings and provide a measured response based on thorough investigation.
4. In addition to the above, I will consider the most appropriate way to communicate my conclusions and follow an evaluative and developmental process suggesting further potential routes of exploration.

Purpose

Identity is an important aspect in everyone's lives, and I believe the people of Great Yarmouth are uncertain of what theirs is. Through comprehensive research, this project will reaffirm the role typography plays in creating that identity and assess its part in highlighting Great Yarmouth's individuality.

The town is a multifaceted community with a rich heritage. It has a significant cultural offering which brings with it a varied populous of inhabitants. This mixture creates an exciting atmosphere, where a community identity can be hard to pinpoint. This project will explore and discover what makes an identity and how typography fits into that concept.

Audience

There are many potential audiences to this project. Initially, it is meant for the residents of the borough - to better understand what it is to be from Great Yarmouth. However, it will also take into consideration those who visit the area, for work or leisure, and those who have preconceived ideas of what it is to be from Great Yarmouth.

I also hope this research project will interest other locales struggling with their own identity and provide a framework for them to discover their own uniqueness. The project will also be of interest to those concerned in design history, typographers, and the wider creative community.

5	Give a brief reflection/overview of the ethics issues in this project.	<p>Identity of place can be a subjective notion and therefore I will want to speak with a variety of people to understand their thoughts and feelings of Great Yarmouth.</p> <p>I will also look to speak with industry professionals as well as those who have a vested interest in either the location or subject matter.</p> <p>All information will be made visible through my on-line blog and retained for the duration of the course. If participants wish for their information to be redacted or removed this will be done as soon as practicable.</p> <p>This is a live document and as such, is subject to change, depending on where the research takes me and who I choose to speak with.</p>
6	Who will the participants be? Identify specifically any vulnerable groups or individuals and address any special measures you intend to take to accommodate them.	<p>Industry professionals including people from the Norfolk Records Office, Norfolk Museum Service, local museums, Heritage Action Zone officers, Council staff, members of the public and those with a creative insight into the subject.</p> <p>I would like to speak with some of the children (13-16 year olds) from the local Saturday Art Club www.saturday-club.org who are looking into ghost signs. Some of them have additional needs which will need careful liaison with both the parent/ guardians of the child as well as the tutor of the group.</p> <p>I would also like to speak with members of the public in the form of surveys and audio recordings. There vulnerability status may not be known until spoken with and therefore the release form needs to be explicit, accessible and easy to understand.</p>
7	How will participants be recruited and how many will be involved?	<p>Participants will be recruited through existing and new networks created for this module. They will be contacted through email or social media and the contact recorded.</p> <p>The number of participants is dependent on the project development and research, however, I hope for this number to be between 5 and 15 key contacts.</p> <p>There are approximately 10 children in the local National Saturday Club. If consent given, this number will be in addition to the key contacts.</p>
8	What will participants be asked to do?	<p>Key contacts will be asked to describe their link with typography / identity of Great Yarmouth as well as their thoughts and feelings of the place.</p> <p>This may be documented through email, audio / visual recordings or via note taking and be presented on my public facing blog.</p>

They will have the option to contribute anonymously or with certain aspects redacted.</p> <p>Children under 18 will only be referred to by their first names and age and consent will be approved by their parents / guardians.</p> <p>Tasks will be descriptive and created in an accessible way.
